EXECUTIVE SUMMERY

1. CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The institution follows and co-operates with the affiliated university in designing and development of the curriculum time to time Ninety percent of the faculty member contributes to the development of the curriculum as the Chairman of Board of Studies, members of syllabus framing committee the institution develops and utilize clear learning plans, conducts various programme, for the effective implementation and enrichment of the curriculum.

The institution offer three Streams: B.A., B.Com. & B.Sc. and the selffinanced post-graduate programmes. The students are facilitated with self financed Distance Mode of Education, YCMOU Nashik.

There are 03 research center of Ph.D. in Geography, Marathi and Commerce and 15 Research Supervisor. The institution follows the semester pattern at UG and PG level as per norms of affiliated university.

A flexibility of choosing subjects provide to the faculty members in organization and participation in various workshops, seminars, conferences, refresher/ orientation courses their contribution in designing the curriculum as BOS gives access for curriculum enrichment.

Beside these, the college, takes efforts to create an awareness among the students concerning cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environmental education, human rights, ICT for the hostel development of the student.

The institute also offers various value added programmes and activities for the enhancement of the student including competitive exam foundation courses soft skills, communication skills, NSS and NCC units of the college are truly the platform for the students for social welfare activities.

2. TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The admission process of the institution is widely publicized through college prospectus, website, and advertisements in the regional newspaper and local T.V. cable channels. The in-house publicity of the process of admission is notified well in advance on the college notice board and all the deadlines, late fee details and so on is furnished in detail for the perusal of the students and their parents.

The institution forms admission committee comprising faculty members from various departments and the whole process is done transparently. All the norms as directed by the state government, university and the reservation policy are strictly observed and all the necessary precautions are taken at every stage to maintain quality and transparency. Proper attention is given to the merit and reservation policy The University has a semester system of UG and PG courses. The same policy is adopted and the institution follows all norms laid down by the university for the courses run in the institution.

The university has introduced evaluation process which comprises unit tests, internal examinations, project reports, seminars, semester end examination and so on. The entire process of evaluation is introduced to the students either through the prospectus of the institution in case of any changes mode by the university.

The institution puts in all possible efforts to improve and elevate students by conducting test, tutorials. seminars. assignments presentation, activities. and so on. Internal examinations are made compulsory for UG level by the university the institution also puts in the efforts to complete the process of teaching and learning more interestingly. Teachers use ICT class room for effective teaching and give presentations on the various topics. Faculty members use traditional Lecture method mostly and they keep using other methods, also to made their teaching move diverse, informative and effective.

The Department of English conducts soft skills classes for our students and try level best to check condusive atmosphere in the campus. Soft skills and life skills basically honed among students to be aspirants for several things in life.

The institution is more particular about teaching and learning ambiance. The heads of all the departments with the help of their faculty members prepare academic year teaching plan for each and every paper and subject. Efforts and made to observe the same in the real time teaching in the class. Academic calendar as introduced by the university which is strictly followed and the instruction for the certain subject or syllabi are given in the class throughout the semester. The principal, Vice Principal and HODs keep maintaining the teaching-learning process time and again. Faculty members are given full freedom to exercise on their own related to their subject or paper. The library plays a major role in the process of dissemination of knowledge in the classroom. The books such as text books, reference books, suggested reading, etc is made available to the faculty members and students.

The departments and faculty members take care of the slow learners and if it is required extra classes are arranged in advance to upgrade the slow learning.

Various departments also conduct different subject related activities as a part of their forum and institution also help economically backward students by the Earn and Learn Scheme. A few students are also adopted by the faculty members and management. The needy are provided with book, hostel, boarding facilities, etc.

The institute has been using technology for over all development of all stakeholders. The entire campus has WIFI internet connectivity. Internet facility is freely made available to all the departments and smart phone holders in the college campus. The faculty members make use of the facility for research activities, research paper writing, use various websites providing academic resources such as <u>www.pdfdrive.com</u>, etc.

The institution has provided computer system to almost all the departments and laboratories. These systems are also provided with the internet connectivity. It enbles the faculty members to prepare their lessons for ICT classes.

Teaching Learning and Evaluation measures taken by the institution has given fruitful results in the course of time. There are a number of students those who have bagged various prizes of the university and a few students topped the university ranks. In the last four years 4 students have been the toppers in the university rank and bagged Dr. A.P. Vitthal Prize for compulsory English. In addition students also topped the university rank in optional English and bagged Late Mallikarjun Award for topper in optional English.

It shows the volume of our contributions not only in one subject but also students have proved their mettle in other of subjects and disciplines also.

In addition to teaching and learning, our institution also encourages students for extracurricular and co-curricular activities, wall posters, banners, charts, seminars, presentations, cultural activities, debates; quizzes etc. are constantly conducted in order to keep the pace of our students with the students in the urban areas.

The institution has pool of qualified teachers 24 have Ph.D. degrees ,11 M.Phil, degrees, 11 SET/NET qualifications. We encourage our faculty members to upgrade themselves and attain the level best. Our faculty members are masters of their subjects and some of them have become well known speakers and recourse persons at national level and keep visiting different states and academic agencies.

Over and above faculty members are evaluated and kept under observation through a system. HOD, Principal, Vice Principal have continuous monitoring of the performance of students and faculty. Teachers' performance is tested through a feedback mechanism and teachers submit their annual self appraisal reports by the end of the year for assessment and increment. After a meticulous study of the feedback form and self appraisal reports recommendation are made by the principal.

3. RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSTIN

The college actively promotes and also financially and administratively supports the research activities of its faculty. Some PG and and UG departments have received funds from funding agencies to carry out minor research projects. The college is prompt in financially supporting a well designed and practical research proposal. It also facilitate timely availability and utilization of the funds received from the funding agencies. Another striking feature of the college regarding its research activity is that it always encourages to promote inter disciplinary research thereby creating synergy between various deciplines. Post graduate departments like Marathi, Geography, Hindi and Commerce have well maintained libraries and have budgetary provisions for research activity. The most of the faculty members have accomplished the Ph.D. degree into three respective subjects. The college runs research center in the subjects Of Geography, Marathi and Commerce. The college follows UGC regulations and direction for M.Phil. and doctoral research. The PG students are encouraged to promote the research activity.

The college has undertaken the consultancy and extension activity research. The college carries out extension activities and organizes camps and other forms through which it involves local and neighborhood communities to participate. In programmes most importantly the research consultancy and extension activities have enabled the college for its academic development.

4. INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCE

The college has a five storey building, a big indoor stadium, gymnasium two hostels. The college constitutes a big auditorium with 500 seating capacity, ICT hall, with a capacity of 200 students, well equipped laboratories and a spacious and ventilated library with capacity of 80 students in additional to this, there are total Well ventilated and spacious class rooms. There are also washrooms for the girls students, class room equipped with LCD project.

Computer with internet facility is made available in all the departments. There are special facilities provided for the physically challenged persons. The entire campus of the college is provided WIFI Connection. The institution has four e-classroom to deliver lectures with PPT. The library is well equipped with computers for students with WIFI facility. The maintenance of projector computer and internet services are done by a local technician. The RO filtered water is provided to the students. According to the need generator is setup time to time regarding the health care and the students a formal MOU has established with Iifecare Hospital & Research Center Udgir. References service, newspaper clipping, suggestion box, those library services are provided to the students.

5. STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

Student is the center around which the whole institution strives endlessly. Along with the academic progress the college aims at crating prefect personalities of the students.

The college publishes a prospectus with various updated details about admissions, scholarships, fee structure, various academic programmers, various student support schemes and rules of the college.

SC/ST/OBC/ Minority/ Differently abled and girl students are facilitated with various students support services given by the government as well as the college. SC/ST/OBC and economically

weak students are provided with statutory reservation Govt. scholarship, coaching classes for competitive exam, remedial coaching classes and concession in the fees.

Lift facility is available for differently abled students. Carrier guidance cell works actively for giving proper carrier guidance to the students. Extra coaching classes are arranged for slow learners. The institute develops entrepreneurial skills among the students through carrier counseling, debates and guest lectures. The students prepare the wall papers, also they are promoted to write their own articles for the annual magazine.

Annual gathering is the platform for the students to expose their various skills. The grievance redressal cell placed complaint boxes in the college. All these problems are resolved by the respective committee. The institute has also constituted antiragging committee to create a friendly atmosphere between junior and senior students.

The Alumni of the institution always contribute for the progress of the college. The institution enhances participation of the students in all activates and bodies of the college. The students are motivated to participate in NSS, NCC unit, Cultural events, Sports. Internet WIFI facility is provided for students. Purified drinking water, health center, canteen facilities are provided for the students.

Indoor stadium, departmental library, fee concession to economically weaker students, woman cell for girls are some other facilities made available for the students. Student is the center of all the activities carried out by the college.

6. GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The college has an efficient co-ordination and internal management system under the observation of top management body and leadership of principal for maintaining good governance. The management board and incumbants of managing committee organize a meeting once in a month, the committee maintains good governance in academic development, record maintenancel, cultural activities, promotion of research, infrastructural development, etc. The dynamic board a directors always think of innovation. There is an effective and good governance in the college.

The college always promotes the leadership qualities among the faculty members through their representation on various statutory bodies. Beside this faculty members are encouraged to take leadership of various committees in the college as well as in the universities.

The college not only inculcate among the students the ancient Indian value but with provision of various facilities, it organizes various programmes.

The formation of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has helped the college to ensure and enhance the quality of education. The IQAC monitors all the academic activities as well as performance of the faculty. The college encourages the faculty members to take part in various activities. The college receives fees of the poor students in installments. The NSS units of the college always participate and organize community related and personality development programmes. For all the three faculties the eligibility criteria is 10+2. The students who quality +2 examination in their respective faculty are given preference to register and enroll them for the

U.G. course.

The institution also offers P.G. courses in faculty of Arts and Commerce. In the faculty of Arts we offer P.G. in 01.M.A. in Marathi 02.M.A. in Hindi

03. M.A. in Geography 04.M.Com (General) For all the P.G. courses the qualifying criteria is the under graduation with the specific subject as the major subject and for P.G. in Commerce, First degree in Commerce is expected to quality.

- The college also offers M.Phil courses in Geography. The process of admission is followed as suggested by the affiliating university. The qualifying criteria for M.Phil in Geography is M.A. in Geography.
- Distance Education:

The College runs a study centre for U.G. and P.G. courses offered through Distance mode. The study centre is affiliated to Yashwantrao Chavan Open University, Nashik. The affiliating university has its own system of admission and it follows its own code of conduct and modalities.

2.2Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution has constructed a ramp at the main gate for the physically challenged students. In addition an elevator has been installed and the physically challenged students can use the facility to more any floor in the building for their class/Lab work. All government policies regarding admission, Scholarship, Fee concessions, examinations etc strictly follows by the college.

2.2.2 Does the institution access the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'Yes' give details on the process.

The institution indirectly assesses the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme. Students enrolled opt for various subjects and the respective subjects teachers informally keep observing the set of students about their basic understanding of the subject. Generally the students are assessed on the basis of merit of the qualifying examination and the teachers concerned put in their efforts for enhancing students' knowledge and skills. Teachers take a complete review of the course as studied by the students in the qualifying examination and efforts are made to bridge the gap it needed so as to bring them up to the level expected at the under graduation.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? [Bridge /Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment courses etc]

The students enrolled in our institution are mostly belonging to rural areas and they struggle a lot in the course of their studies. The teachers of the respective subject counsel students in the class and put in their efforts to identify the knowledge gap. Once the gap is identified, the teacher concerned conduct a few books so that they enrich their standard. The slow learners are particularly take care of by the respective subject teachers. The counseling cell of the college helps the students in case of stress, depression and self-esteem.

In addition, the following strategies are adopted to bridge the knowledge gap:

- ▶ Bilinguel explanation in the class/lab.
- ➢ Slow learners are identified and counseled.
- ▶ Remedial classes are organized for slow learners.
- Extra books are issued to slow/bright students to upgrade them in the subject.
- Revision of topics unit tests, quiz etc are conducted for better understanding.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, Inclusion, Environment etc?

The institution has formed the women's cell to address the issues related to women staff and students. The cell encourages each stakeholders about gender equality and put in efforts to increase the participation of women in various academic, cultural and sports activities. The cell also conducts activities and empowers to women so that they can stand on their own and be self-reliant socially and financially. The cell also makes every stakeholder aware of their social responsibility towords women and empowers them against sexual harassment and exploitation. The cell took the initiative and trained a few girl students for self defense.

- The college puts-in sincere efforts to create healthy atmosphere in the campus. The promotion of scientific and environmental awareness is done by conducting various seminars and lectures on the issues related to environment, Science, Superstitions, Caste eradication etc.
- NCC and NSS units of the college also conduct several activities on socio-cultural, health awareness, gender equality, cleanliness, hygiene etc.

2.2.5 How does the institution identity and respond to special educational/Learning needs of advanced learners?

Subject teacher keep on monitoring students right from the beginning of the programme. The slow/average/bright students are identified in the course of time and special need based efforts are made to meet their educational/learning needs. The following measures are taken in the institution.

- Extra books are issued to advanced learners.
- The college provides T.A.D.A. to the students to participate in seminars and workshops.
- Special coaching and monitoring by the subject teachers.
- Free internet facility is provided.
- Toppers in the class are felicitated in annual gathering of college.
- Continuous assessment is done so as to upgrade the quality and performance.
- Advanced learners are encourage to participate in various academic activities.
- Quiz, debate, elocution, seminars are conducted and efforts are made for dynamic personality building.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme durations) of the students of risk of drop out (Students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The college collects data on the academic performance of the students at risk of drop out from class lectures, tests, mid-term examinations and so on. This data is used while dealing with the students at risk of drop out. Efforts are made to counsel them for regularity and punctuality in the class. Similarly the reasons are identified for their absence in the class and tests students wise the strategies are adopted to solve the problem. The efforts are made under the following categories of students.

01. Disadvantaged sections of society:

- Scholarships sponsored by Central/State govts offered to the students and the funds are smoothly transferred to their accounts.
- Students are given concession based on their eligibility, merit etc.

02. slow learners:

- Personal, academic and social councelling.
- Bilingual teaching and discussions.
- Remedial classes and special attention.
- Personal monitoring by the teacher concerned.

03. Economically weaker sections:

- Free ships other concessions are offered.
- Free books, students welfare fund, earn and learn scheme, financial assistance.
- Waiving the fee of the meritorious students based on their parental financial condition.

04. Physically challenged students:

Fee concession is provided Ramp facility is made available to the students

- Conducive atmosphere is created in the campus to help the student.
- The students can directly interact with cashier and clerk without standing in queue while paying fees of other work.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print etc.) ?

Academic Calendar:

The college adopts the Academic Calendar scheduled by the affiliating SRTM University. The Academic planning committee adds an few additional events and programmes. All the heads of various departments after consulting with the teaching staff of the department schedule the academic calendar before the commersement of the session.

Teaching Plan:

Each faculty members prepares a teaching plan for every semester. It highlights the inputs like the content in the syllabus and the required number of classes for the content. Evaluation Blue Print:

The college examination committee prepares a schedule for conducting the Internal Md-Term examination. The smooth conduct of the Examinations, Evaluation, Announcement of result. Mark submission in the specified format etc. This enables all the stakeholders to know the complete framework of the examination and evaluation process. Notifications and circulars regarding examination are displayed time to time and proper communication is done through proper channel.

Semester end examinations are conducted by the affiliating university.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC committee is found in the college. This is supreme committee in the college. IQAC collects the feedbacks from the feedback are discussed and analyzed seriously with the Principal IQAC gives advice for better implementation and improvement in teaching – learning process. IQAC helps to facilitate ICT technology to the staff and gives advice to use the power point presentation for effecting teaching – learning process.

IQAC encourages the faculty for participate in Seminars, Conferences, Orientation refresher courses for upgradation of the teaching skill, IQAC recommends to the library equipments in the laboratories and infrastructural facilities.

IQAC motivates to faculty to organize Seminars, Workshops, Conferences and short term courses IQAC is the key committee to co-ordiate all stakeholders to improve teaching – learning process.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The college believes in the student – centric approach for the dissemination of pedagogy. All the faculty members adopt interactive method of teaching, this method facilitates students and teachers both. Teachers use audio – video hall for interactive teaching and within the class room also they adopt interactive method. This enables students and teachers both to focus more on the content and comprehensive understanding of the subject matter.

Students are given tutorials and projects which they can do collaborate. This creates a conducive atmosphere among the students and they develop team spirit.

In addition students are encouraged to be self – reliant and self sufficient not only in teams of educational matters but also the real time experience of life.

Students are participated in the seminars and workshops organized by outstation colleges and in the university. For ex. M.M.Nilanga organized seminars on modulation and demodulation. Many students of electronics and physics of the college confidently presented their papers, maths students also participated at in such workshops and exhibitions.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college puts-in efforts to cater to the needs of students and transform them in to life-long learners and innovators. The Department of English conduct 'Soft Skills' classes for BA/B.com/B.sc students. The inputs such as Positive Thinking, Communication Skills, Critical Thinking, reactivity, Scientific Temper, Negotiation Skills, Time Management, Stress Management etc. There classes make the learners creative, innovative and help them lifelong. The teachers of other subject also put in their efforts in this direction and whenever they get on opportunity in this connection they in cash it in their own ways.

The Department of History, Sociology and Geography organize educational tours and bring the real world to the notice of the students.

Department of Commerce arranges industrial tour so that learners get the lessons on industrial developments.

Department of Botany organizes educational tour to Botanical Garden or to the region where they find various kinds of plants and herbs.

Various departments organize quest lectures on different topics to create conducive atmosphere in the campus.

The college organizes seminars and workshops on anti-superstition. Eminent and expert personalities delivered their speech to faster scientific temper among the students. The NSS unit organizes workshops on science of snakes, magic programmes for the students also activily participated in such camps. Wallpapers are presented by various departments, students write their articles in college published annual magazine.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Example, Virtual laboratories, E- Learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Educational through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT) open educational resources, Mobile Education, etc.

The College established Audio-Video Hall for Interactive teaching and learning. Most of the faculty members use the facility in the college. The college also has class rooms which are well equipped with LCD Projector with a computer system and audio system. Department of English prominently use the facility and arrange Audio-Video shows for various English Plays. The Department also developed PPTs on various topics on communication skills and soft skills and conduct Seminars for students of BA, B.com, B.sc. In addition the video lectures and E-Content developed by Dr.Gore Vitthal which are produced by EMMRC Hyderabad as the part of NME-ICT project are also shown to the students based on their educational needs.

Department of Hindi also arranges shows on the Hindi plays and put in their efforts for effective understanding of the plays and short stories.

Other Departments also use the facility and provide better platform to the learners of the institution.

The college has virtual library and a facility of INFLIBINET to access ejournals by the student and faculty. The laboratories are well equipped with modern and sophisticated instruments.

Each department has a computer with NET broadband connection for staff and students. Computers and laptops are used in the seminars and workshops by the students and faculty.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advance level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, Expert Lectures, Seminars, Workshops, etc)?

All the teachers are aware of their responsibility and they keep pace with new developments in their subjects:

- 01. Guest lectures, Seminars, Presentations and Extension Lectures are organized on regular basis by all the departments to update their knowledge and skills. The topic allotted to the Guest Faculties is mostly given on the latest development in the respective subjects.
- 02. Students are encouraged for creative writing and insist them to contribute articles for the magazine. Students are also encouraged and to participate in various academic activities in order to update their knowledge and skills.
- 03. Department of Geography, Botany, Zoology conduct field work.
- 04. Department of Commerce, History and Sociology organize industrial tours and educational tours.
- 05. To update the knowledge and skills of students and teachers Central Library of the college subscribe journals and magazines on various subjects and current affairs.
- 06. Newspapers in Hindi, Marathi and English are also made available for updation and current affairs.
- 07. The college organize National Seminars, Conferences and short term courses in the campus.
- 08. Faculty members are encouraged to participate in the Refresher courses and Orientation Courses.
- 09. A few faculty members of are college are also invited as the Resource Persons and Expert Lectures. They are encouraged to go for various academic activities.
- 10. Teachers are encouraged to publish research articles in National and International Journals.

2.3.7 Detail (Process and the number of students benefited) on the academic personal and Psycho-social support and guidance and services (Professional counseling / Mentoring / Academic advise) provided to students?

The academic, personal and Psycho-social support and guidance services are provided to the students, the details are as follows:

Academic Support:

- Advising students to choose the faculty / subjects etc.
- Helping students for preparation and supply study material.
- Conducting remedial classes for slow learners.
- Conducting / Organizing Guest lectures and Expert lectures.

Personal and Psycho-social Support:

- Teachers maintain relation with students and slow some concern with them so as to understand their personal problems and difficulties.
- Providing financial and academic support.
- Encouraging students for academic development.
- Career counseling and preparation for competitive examinations.

Guidance Services/Career Guidance Cell:

- Competitive examinations guidance cell conduct special classes and offer a platfarm for rural students to prepare for group 'A' and 'B' examinations.
- Soft skills training programme is also help by the department of English and extended help to the guidance cell. Ten hours of training on positive attitude. Communication skills, negotiation skills, etc were conducted during the training programme.
- Guidance cell created a study centre for competitive examination and a good number of students from BA/B.com/B.sc are benefited.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/Methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college has set up Audio-Video Hall for interactive and effective teaching learning process.

- Department of English conducted soft skills classes in the Seminar Hall with the Audio-Video facility.
- Department of Hindi organize video sessions on the Hindi plays and short stories prescribed in the U.G. syllabus.
- Department of English arranged video sessions on the English plays and fictions prescribed in the U.G. syllabus.
- NME-ICT sponsored and EMMRC produced video lectures on various topics related to Indian Writing in English, American Literature, British Literature and English Language, etc are also organized in the Seminar Hall.
- Various Departments arrange Guest lectures and Expert Lectures on different topics.
- Some departments organize study tours and field works. The department of Geography, History, sociology, Botany etc.

2.3.9 How are Library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

The Central Library of the college is centrally located and can be accessed easily. The Library has resources useful for all subject teachers and students.

- The library has subscribed various journals related to different faculties and subjects.
- The library has subscribed newspapers and Magazines to upgrade the knowledge of current affairs and events.
- The library maintains a separate wing/Section for journal magazines and students and teachers are benefited.
- The library also maintains a separate section for competitive examination.
- The central library maintain question book for all faculties and subjects and provide the some to the students and teachers whenever required.
- In case of syllabus revision the new titles on required are made available in the library.
- The library has separate reading room for students and faculty.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar ? if yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these ?

Due to Govt. rules and regulations and the bas on requirement, the college has to appoint faculties on Clock Hour Basis. This naturally affect negatively on the completion of curriculum, commitment to the academics, Accountability and so on.

The semester system followed for non-professional courses. The semester after the winter vacation is not sufficient for curricular requirement. This semester is greatly affected due to annual gathering, prolonged semester and examinations etc.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning?

The college feedback committee monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching-learning process. The feedback is about the performance and quality of teachers. The feedback of each teacher is conducted every year in a specified format. The feedback forms are evaluated by the committee and the inputs are given to the respective teacher if needed.

The Heads of various departments keep monitoring the class teaching done by different faculty members of the respective department. Continuous monitoring and interactions with the students help the department and college to maintain and evaluate quality. The Principal also meets the heads of departments and regularly takes the feedback about the teaching-learning process.

In addition the college grievance redressal mechanism also takes care of the quality of the teaching learning.

A suggestion box has been installed in the central location and students feel free to express and give us the feedback about academic and administration.

The recruitment of all the teachers is done through proper channel and the notification at state/National level is given in the leading newspapers. The university and the affiliating university form an expert panel which comprises three subject experts, one government nominee, one V.C. nominee, Principal of the college, HOD, President and management nominee. The services of each teaching staff are governed by govt. of Maharashtra and SRTMUN.

The clock hour basis requirement are made depending on the need and scope of the subject necessary approval is taken from the govt. and university local management committee and experts committee select the candidates as per the rules and regulations and qualification criteria are strictly followed after the appointment the govt. and the university approves the process and release the funds for their payments.

It also helps to come across the function of departments in college has a mechanism to look after the co-ordination among students, teaching staff and non teaching staff. Staff secretary, student council representative and office secretary communicate among themselves the issue under the guidance of Principal.


6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The Principal and few senior faculty guides the students every year in the commencement of the classes about code of conduct in the college campus. This orientation helps to the newly admitted students.

- Unit tests were conducted.
- Suggestions and feedback forms are received by arranging a special meetings to resolve the problems.
- Use of ICT in teaching Learning process.
- Indoor stadium facility is available to the students.
- Audio Video facility is provided to the staff and students.
- Reputed music department for the students.
- Big auditorium hall to organize various academic and co-curricular programmes.
- Digitalized library facility. (Use of SOUL software)
- Administrative work is computerized.
- The NSS programme officers of our college and taluka panchyat samiti, Udgir were adopted a Village named 'Waghdgari' to have a toilet facility to each house. It is then declared 'Hagandari Mukt Gaon' by the Maharashtra government.
- The institution is located in a drought prone region of Marathwada. Many farmers in this region committed suicide. So we appointed to the students as Yuva Gram Mitra to counsel the farmers.
- The Principal & few faculty members organized programmes to the villager named as 'Dushkal Nivaran Prabodhan Adbhiyan'. In this they delivered speeches in various villages for the farmers.
- The institution has collaboration with 'Maharashtra Andhashrudha Nirmulan Samiti, Udgir'. It is non Government social organization. The college organized two days workshop for the half Latur district secondary school teachers. The teachers trained to inculcate to fight against superstition.
- Reading hobby competition organized by the library every year on the occasion of birth anniversary of Rangnathan a father of library.
- CCTV cameras are installed for surveillance at every wing of the college building.
- Youth Welfare Cell established to interact with the students for their guidance.
- Principal encourages the faculty to participate & organize orientation program, refresher courses, Seminars, Conferences, Workshops & Short Term courses.
- The conducive atmosphere is created to publish research papers in reputed Journals, conferences and seminars.

- Generally one student representative is nominated by the colleges in the NSS special Camp. But the NSS unit of our college forms numbers of groups of eight students and each group select their representative. Hence college inculcates leadership skill among the volunteers. Each group has assigned a day to work innovative.
- Active participation of the Students & faculty in the Ekta Daud i.e. Unity March organized by Deputy-superintendent of police (Dy.SP).
- Karate training for self defense to girl students by the trained person (Trainer).
- 'Digital India week' celebrated by debate, essay, and elocution Competition and speeches of eminent personalities.
- Participation of NSS volunteers in clean city movement organized by district sub divisional health centre. The cleanliness work of volunteers was appreciated by the committee.
- The college campus is ragging free and no-smoking zone.
- Extra security to the girl students coming from nearby villages.
- Lift facility available. This facility has only in our college in the district.
- A voter awareness program organized
- Personality development workshop of the motivational trainer for the students.
- Diabetic awareness program in collaboration with Lion's Club eye hospital. The students did survey with filling the forms by visiting door to door in their native villages.
- Many faculty members donated blood every year on the birthday occasion of Hon'ble Shri Shivraj Patil Chakurkar, Ex- Home Minister of India and Chancellor of Punjab.
- Participative governance in the institution.
- Librarian helps the students while using the internet.
- Farewell ceremony organizes for final year students & retired staff.
- The Principal motivates the faculty for persuasion of the M. Phil & Ph.D. Degree.
- Many Faculties published their research papers in the international Conferences abroad.
- The faculty member, Dr. Shere Ishwar attended two months summer research programme at Tata Institute of fundamental research, Mumbai.
- Mahatma Basweshwar Study centre is established in the Institution. The lord Bashweshwara was a great social reformer. The casteism is big problem in republic India. The Bashweshwara did a work to eradicate caste, cread and religion among the peoples. This centre work to inculcate the equality principal among the students.
- To facilitate the Principal, all the departments of the college, library, college office & Principal cabin are connected by Intercom facility for easy accessing.

Goal :-

- 3) To make enable the resolve the problems associated with drought.
- 4) To inculcate the leadership skill among the students.
- 5) To educate the people to save the water.
- 6) To imbibe the importance of tree plantation in the minds of people.

The Context :-

Geographically India is a big country. The Indian sub-continent has rain fall generally in the durations months June to September. It is volatile in nature. Some part of the country attracted by flood and some part by the drought. These natural calamities have been attracting the life of the Indians. The major business of the people in India relates to Agriculture. The farming is totally based on rainfall. The quantity of raining is different in different regions some region have heavy raining & some just showers. It is unproportional and non-uniform in nature. The timing pattern of raining is uncertain. Some time it takes long span for raining.

Udgir is located in Marathwada region of the Maharashtra. It is drought zone region. This region frequently experiences drought. The people of this region are always facing this natural calamity. Due to this reason the institution has taken this for consideration.

The Practice

The institution is located in semi-region. Many students enrolled in the college are from nearby villages Their parents are farmers or farm labors. The source of income of the parents is dependent an agriculture or livestock production. The agriculture is depend on rain fed, since last few years this region has severe scarcity of water. These problems were discussed in the annual meeting of the staff. Finally we came to the conclusion that the staff would try to give some relief to these drought stricken depending on their ability to of work few examples are gives below :-

Dr. Honrao D. R. has delivered number of speeches in water council which established in Udgir under late Dr. N. Y. Dole pratisthan.

Dr. Tangawar M. E. has exhorted people to save environment, through series of speeches which was telecasted on radio NSS camp has been organiged by the institution in the villages. Dr. Chimore S. Y., Dr. Tangawar M. E. programme officer Dr. Shere I. N., Dr. Deoshitte P. M., Shri S. L. Usturge, Principal Dr. Velapurkar B. G., Dr. Rathod H. B. of our college and Dr. Chiddarwar, Principal Dr. Mahesh Betkar and Marathi Vidnyan Parishad Members & others have guided to our students and villages about the plantation & nurturing of it by giving examples such as saint and environment.

The water is supplied to Udgirr city from the 'Banshelki Dam' few years ago it become totally dry. There was no water but lot of soil has been accumulated. Dr. Shinde S. N. with non-government organization has worked to remove the soil from the dam. Now the dam becomes wide and deep, its water storing capacity has increased.

Dr. Kauthale Amit took lot of efforts by giving door to door visit to persuade people for water harvesting. He has succeeded in his work. Many citizens were dug pit and installed water harvesting equipment in their own houses. The water is percolating under the ground.

The last year, under the chairmanship of respected principal Dr. P. E. Vibhute, a committee was established. The committee comprised Dr. Ishwar Shere, Dr. Manohar Bhandare & Dr. M. E. Tangawar. A schedule of program was prepared, to visit various villages on different days. These committee members and principal delivered their speeches about cultivation of the land, kind of crops, group farming uses of pesticides, fertilizer and seeds, plantation along roads and empty spaces uses technology, cultivation of land, kind of irrigation, wastage of water, to educate their wards, preventing suicide water conservation and so on. We got lot of response from the villagers. It was termed as 'Dushkal Nivarn Prabodhan Abhiyan' it means drought redressed exhortation programme.

A Special issue of Annual magazine named 'Baliraja' was published by the institution. (It has got a third prize by the S. R. T. M. University, Nanded). It contains many articles written by the students on drought and farmers.

The institution has organized a speech of waterman Rajendrasing Rana. The purpose of his talk was to give discourse on the water conservation & inter-linkages of rivers within India. There was a good interaction between public and Rana.

The college has appointed 'Yuva Gram Mitra' for the students those have participated in the social activities of the college. They have first counseled in the meeting about problems of the villagers and letter to solve their problems. It the problem is out of the capacity of the student then one of the faculty visited and guided to the respective victim.

Dr. Sunita lohare has worked for water harvesting with the 'Marathwada janta vikas parishad' organization they have guided to the people about water harvesting. They have distributed water pouches in summer days at bus stand and railway station.

In this way, the institution has contributed to give some relief to the drought affected people.

Evidence of success :-

The intellectual speeches given by the experts motivates the students to work for the society. The students are encouraged and started to work for water conservation, water harvesting, tree plantation etc. They are guiding to the villagers and giving the information about government policies. The Students are taking initiatives in their villages for social work. Their leadership skill, talking in group, moral & social values are growing.

Many farmers contributed some amount in government schemes for widening and deepening the rivulet and rivers in the villages.

Many people in the city makes water harvesting in their houses . Therefore water level of the borewell has increased.

The soil accumulated in the dam has removed so the capacity of the water storage of the dam has increased.

This campaign of the institution gives ray of hope to the drought-striken.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required :-

- Initially the peoples were not listening to the 'Yova Gram Mitra' because the students were of the smaller in age. Girls students were hesitant to guide their own villagers.
- People seemed reluctant to make the water harvesting.
- Many farmers were expecting the help in the form of money.

BEST PRACTICE -2

1) ERADICATION OF THE SUPERSTITION.

Goal:-

The Context:-

India is a fast progressive nation in all respective in the world. Indians are top in education all over the world. There is a rapid development in science and technology in the contrary, there is a strong belief in supernatural powers. The people believe in with craft, sorcery, black magic, evil eyes, possession by a spirit, ghosts etc. This blind belief gives birth to superstition. Superstition is transmitted from of our ancient civilization. It arises from an unseen fear and ignorance. The selfish people such as exorcist, palmist, Babas, priests, Astrologer & charlatans are taking the benefits of this. These are extracting money from superstitious people. Many Baba's sexually assaulted young girls. Generally main victims of these Baba's are illiterate, economically backward, downtrodden children women. They duped such people easily.

We have seen that many politicians, well educated people, businessmen, heroes & heroines of the film industry etc. Such elite are moving around these Baba's.

Most of the superstitious belief in the society are found as old traditions which transmitted from one generation to another.

There are number of examples of publishing superstation and these are given below.

- 1) The widow present in the marriage ceremony is considered as ominous. She is ill treated. Her life becomes tragic.
- 2) The empty pot come across while going to do an important work is considered as unsuspicious.
- 3) The farmer feed his cattles bread while selling because it benefits to the buyer and it is considered as auspicious.
- 4) To inculcate the scientific temper among the students. To imbine the social awareness in of the institution the minds the students. these are the objectives.

The Practice :-

The institution is located in Marathwada region of the Maharashtra. It is considered of a backward region. Many students enrolled in the institution are from villages. They belongs to illiterate economical weak sections of the society, and superstitious family background. Superstition is deeply rooted in the students The prime objective of the institution eradication of superstitions.

The college organized two days workshop on eradication of superstition for secondary school teachers. In this workshop more than 150 teachers from Udgir, Deoni, Jallcot, Shirur Anantpal and Ahemadpur taluka/tahshil were participated.

The college has organized one da workshop on phaljoytishya samaj Aani Vastav' Dr. Nitin shinde Asso. Prof. in Astrophysics, Islampur, taluka Sangli was a chief guest. He has delivered intellectual speech through ppt. Many students were Participated in the discussion with Dr. shinde. There was a discussion session. These workshop were too much fruitful for students and staff. Mrs. Sunitatai Aarlikar, a renowned social activist, received of Women Award by govt. of India, has guided to the girl students of the college. She shared her experiences with the girl students.

In every academic year, NSS camps were organized by the college in the near by villages. Intellectual speeches over the eradication of superstition were organized in the camps. Many villages and the students seek the benefit of these programs. The eminent miracle worker presented experiments on various miracles on superstitios. These miracles are related to the kind by which Baba's duped to superstitious people. The students and villagers are participated in these experiments.

Few faculty members of the institution are contributed to the social activities for the eradication of superstition. They have delivered many speeches in Udgir and in the near by villages.

The institution has published annual magazine on superstition titled by "Jaagar". The articles on superstition written by the students are composed in the special magazine the students were prepared intellectual articles. They got an opportunity to understand the evils of superstition.

The students of the institution are thinking scientifically. Their message of eradicator of superstition in the society. They have a social awareness. The students understand that every phenomenon happening in the world has a cause, without cause there is no effect. Eradication is only possible by the education and social awaraness. Superstition are baseless and should be given up which are imbibed in the minds of people. The institution has cullivated rationality and scientific attitude among the students and the superstitions people . There is no supernatural power no back magic, no ghosts etc. all these are inhuman acts inculcated among the people.

One such case of black magic has been resolved with social activities from a kumdal village. The students of institution have written their intellectual articles in the college Annual Special Magazine with their own understanding. This magazine got an award by S.R.T.M.U. Nanded.

Problems encountered and resources required :-

The students of the college are basically from small villages many students are belonging to Banjara and backward community, These students are closely observed the events of superstitions. Superstition is deeply rooted in their minds. They are participated in many rites of superstitious. To remove superstition from their minds was extremely difficult fask. The parents of the students are illiterate and ignorant. The students were also hesitant initially they were hesitated to participate in this program organized by the college. The participation of girl students in such programs was a big problem. But by the continuous effort took by the institution to eradicate superstition benefited to the students. Now the students are thinking scientifically.
